Moon Phases November 2025









Full "Beaver" Moon November 5th 6:19 AM

Third Quarter Moon November 11th 10:28 PM

New Moon November 19th 11:47 PM

First Quarter Moon November 27th 11:58 PM

The Hunter's Moon (Some Years)

The Full Moon in November is named after beavers. It can also be the Hunter's Moon, if it follows the Harvest Moon, or Mourning Moon, depending on the December solstice.

The Hunter's Moon follows the Harvest Moon. Every three years or so, the Harvest Moon falls in October, which makes November's Full Moon the Hunter's Moon.

This happens in 2025. The closest Full Moon to the September equinox (on September 22nd) was on October 7th: This was the Harvest Moon. The following Full Moon is November 5th—this becomes the Hunter's Moon.

In Celtic tradition, the last Full Moon before the December solstice has also been named the Mourning Moon or the Darkest Depths Moon.

The astronomical seasons do not match up with the lunar months. Therefore, the month of the Mourning Moon in the Northern Hemisphere varies. In some years, the Mourning Moon is in November, while in others, it is in December.

- 1. After signing up on the EVAC outreach email list, always check your email before leaving for an event for any updates, changes, or cancellations.
- 2. Arrive early enough to have your equipment setup before start time of the event.
- 3. We do not allow any public viewing until the Sun is completely below the horizon.
- 4. No lasers mounted on telescopes. Volunteers are allowed to use lasers to point out objects in the night sky by holding the laser above your head while using. Do not give the laser to visitors to operate.

Meeting Minutes

Welcome

- EVAC President, Steve Bradshaw, invited everyone to the meeting.
- There were 2 new guests recognized.
- There were 50 people in attendance and 25 on the Zoom call.
- Membership and Information: Members were reminded how to join and stay informed via email announcements, the website, and the club's Facebook page.
- Classes: James Yoder is starting a Beginner Telescope Class on October 27th, consisting of five Zoom sessions and four hands-on telescope nights.
- Alice Klobe, the Events Coordinator, provided details on the East Valley Astronomy Club's (EVAC) mission to give back to
 the community and share the love of astronomy through two primary avenues: The GRCO Observatory and Public Outreach Events. Alice also reviewed past and future public outreaches for the club.
- Election for 2026 officers will be held at the club meeting in November.
 - Vice President Andrea Mathias
 - Secretary John Dunegan
 - Board Members Merrell Jenks, Leo Libby, Martin Cuevas
 - No candidate yet for President or Treasurer.
 - Steve & Brooks are considering another term if needed. If so, a vote will be needed to amend the bylaws at the November meeting.
- The club's big yearly event, the All-AZ Star Party, is scheduled for October 24th and 25th at the Hovatter Road site. The event will feature a potluck, a build-your-own taco bar (\$5), and a raffle with a 127mm Mak-Cass telescope as the grand prize.

Featured Speakers

Club member, Nathan Eskey, introduced the Libby Library app, a free digital borrowing platform connected to your local public library, allowing users to download ebooks, audiobooks, and magazines onto their smartphone, tablet, or computer using their library card. Libby features extensive educational materials, particularly in astronomy, where users can find the popular Astronomy magazine, a wide catalog of astronomical books covering everything from popular science to beginner's guides, including titles by authors like Neil deGrasse Tyson and Bill Bryson. Standard Libby features remain available, such as offline access, progress syncing across devices, and the ability to send ebooks to a Kindle. The availability of these specific astronomy resources depends on your local library's current collection.

Robert Asumendi, presented via Zoom his company, Analog Sky, which specializes in designing and selling DIY kits for 3D-printed astronomical binoculars and telescopes. Mr. Asumendi shared that his motivation for creating these designs stemmed from frustrations with traditional telescopes, specifically issues related to astigmatism. Analog Sky kits provide everything needed for assembly: all 3D-printed parts, optics, and hardware. He showcased several models, including the Magic, which features 50mm f/4.5 objective lenses for a bright, wide field of view, and The Heart, equipped with larger 80mm f/5 objectives. Concluding the talk, Mr. Asumendi revealed the newest model, The Bloom, a large-aperture binocular telescope featuring 8-inch (200mm)mirrors designed for deep-sky observation.

Vanessa Gressieux, Guide and Docent Coordinator at Kitt Peak National Observatory (KPNO), shared details about the observatory's vibrant public outreach efforts. These programs rely heavily on both dedicated Volunteer Docents who lead daytime tours of major instruments, such as the historic McMath-Pierce Solar Telescope, and Paid Evening Guides who conduct the popular Nightly Observing Programs. Both volunteer and paid roles are crucial in sharing the cutting-edge science happening at KPNO with the public, from school groups to dedicated amateur astronomers






Monthly Meetings will be held in person and also presented live online using Zoom. See the EVAC Website for updates.
